WHEREAS, H.R. 676, a United States Congressional bill written by Congressman John Conyers (Dem.-MI.) calls for a single payer health care system, which would cover every person in the United States of America for medical care including prescription drugs, hospital, surgical, outpatient services, primary and preventive care, emergency services, dental, mental health, home health care, physical therapy, rehabilitation, vision care, chiropractic and long term care; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 676 would save billions of dollars annually by eliminating the administrative burdens, overhead and profits of the private health insurance industry and apply those savings to improved and expanded coverage for all; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 676 has been endorsed by 39 State AFL-CIOs, over 500 Union organizations in 49 states including 125 Central Labor Councils and Area Labor Federations; and

WHEREAS, The delegates convened at the 65th Quadrennial IATSE Convention in 2005 unanimously approved a resolution in regard to universal health care; and

Hill/Raleigh), Local 751 (New York), Local 764 (New York), USA 829, Local 798 (New York), ATPAM 18032 (New York), and District 10 (New York, New Jersey) have all endorsed H.R. 676.

RESOLUTION NO. 20

WHEREAS, It has been proven that membership in a labor union provides increased opportunities and a better standard of living for working families; and

WHEREAS, Current labor laws create unrealistic impediments to the fundamental right to form and join a union and negotiate an initial collective bargaining agreement;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the delegates at the 81st Annual Seventh District convention endorse the enactment of the Employee Free Choice Act and other legislation to level the playing field and support all workers right to bargain collectively and be represented by a union.

RESOLUTION NO. 21

WHEREAS, The freedom to form or join a union is recognized as a fundamental human right; and

WHEREAS, In the National Labor Relations Act of 1935 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 151 et seq.) the United States Congress declared it to be the policy of the United States to encourage the practice of collective bargaining by protecting the exercise by workers of full freedom of association, self organization, and designation of representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating the terms and conditions of their employment or other mutual aid or protection; and

WHEREAS, Unions have been the key factor in building the middle class in this country and have been instrumental in establishing basic working standards such as the 8-hour day, overtime pay and the right to a lunch break; and

WHEREAS, The seriousness of the current economic crisis makes it more important than ever for workers to bargain collectively for the opportunity of a better life, and the best avenue to rebuild the middle class is through labor and the power to bargain collectively, and a worker's right to join a union is essential to rebuilding our broken economy and revitalizing our middle class; and

WHEREAS, The current National Labor Relations Board elections process fosters interference from management and employers who often intimidate, harass, coerce and even fire workers who try to form unions and bargain for economic well-being, and corporations systematically budget millions of dollars to frustrate workers' efforts to organize in the consistent attempt to deny workers a fundamental right to form a union; and

WHEREAS, Under today's current labor relations laws, working people are powerless to bargain for better wages, while CEOs continue to record outrageous profits, underscoring the need for new policies that protect workers and their right to organize; and

WHEREAS, When the freedom of workers to form a union is denied, wages decline, race and gender pay gaps widen, workplace discrimination increases, job safety standards lapse, and injured workers are denied timely medical treatment, equitable lost wage compensation and other reasonable protections and return to work benefits; and

WHEREAS, The current system has failed workers and must be reformed to ensure that all

workers have the freedom to choose whether or not to join a union free from management threats and intimidation; and

WHEREAS, 53% of non-union, non-managerial workers would vote to join a union if given the opportunity – Peter Hart Associates; and

WHEREAS, Federal legislation known as the Employee Free Choice Act will be introduced this year in the United States Congress which will level the playing field and restore the freedom to form unions and bargain for better wages and benefits by allowing workers to join a union if the majority wants one, increase penalties for companies that abuse workers who are exercising their freedom to form unions and bargain collectively; and

WHEREAS, It is imperative for the greatness of this Nation that the freedom to organize labor unions be restored and expanded;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That District 2 IATSE fully supports the Employee Free Choice Act, and requests the Congress of the United States to enact federal legislation that would protect and preserve the freedom of America's workers to organize and join unions by establishing meaningful penalties for violations of a worker's right to join a union, authorizing the National Labor Relations Board to certify a union by majority sign-up and providing for first contract mediation and arbitration.
