STAND STRONG, RENT UNION: A CALL TO ACTION FOR LOCAL 44 MEMBERS

As members of IATSE Local 44, we understand that our strength lies in solidarity-not just during bargaining, but in the everyday choices we make in the workplace. The decisions about where we source our props, set dressing, and live or artificial plants are no exception. As members, we have a powerful opportunity to support one another by consciously prioritizing studio facility departments and union-affiliated rental houses/vendors. This isn't just about finding the right items for the set; it's an act of solidarity that strengthens the collective future of our Union.

By directing production budget spending toward studio facilities or union rental houses, you're doing more than completing the 'set'— you're reinvesting in the Motion Picture Industry's health and benefit plans, which we all depend on and have fought hard to secure. Every dollar spent with these companies and facilities strengthens our col-

lective well-being and supports the families of our members.

Now more than ever, we must find ways to put members back to work. Instead of relying on vendor deliveries, use studio trucks and Local 44 crews for pickups and returns. This simple step creates jobs, generates contribution hours, and reinforces our jurisdiction.

Renting from union-affiliated companies also benefits the environment. The rise of online shopping and cheap imports has significantly changed how we acquire props and set dressing, often leading to unnecessary waste. Renting instead of buying reduces waste, minimizes our industry's carbon footprint, and supports the vendors we rely on to complete our work—all while creating more jobs for members.

The industry is evolving rapidly, with some studio facilities moving off the lots or closing entirely. Additionally, productions are increasingly utilizing subcontractors to meet their needs. These industry shifts have been detrimental, but they don't have to

be. Our Local 44 department heads can steer these changes in the right direction by choosing to do business with companies and facilities that operate under union contracts. Making the wrong choice undermines our strength, compromises our position at the bargaining table, and hinders our ability to grow and secure future work opportunities for members.

The solution is clear: prioritize union-affiliated rental houses and greens vendors for every project. Make every rental a statement of solidarity and a commitment to our shared values. Let's demonstrate our strength by supporting one another and securing a stronger future for our Union.

We all had our first day in the film industry. Some, like me, had no idea what had just begun. A 3AM call as a Production PA on a tiny independent feature quickly escalated into a 6 AM meeting of the Art Director, who was working without a decorator, telling me I now worked for the Art Department. Short on time, I was handed a list of furnishings for a 12-vear-old girl's bedroom from 1985, an envelope of petty cash, and curt instructions to go to ISS, Uni, Omega, and to stop somewhere and get greens. Wide- eyed and in over my head, my first thought was... "What is a Uni?" But as I frantically navigated from shop to shop, a clear pattern emerged: I might have been in over my head, but every prop house I visited made sure I didn't drown. They helped me, had my back, and made sure I delivered exactly what my set needed. In that blur of panic and excitement, long before I fully understood the full scope of a decorator's duties, I learned who decorators can rely on. The generosity and steadiness I found in those shops wasn't just a lucky first day, it was the standard; a standard I would come to depend on throughout my entire career.

What began as casual acquaintances and warehouses full of resources

soon became friendships and trusted working relationships. These rental houses were not just places to rent from but places to rely upon. The people inside Local 44's signatory shops became collaborators, problem-solvers, and often a rare pillar of dependability in an extremely unpredictable working environment. When I needed a last-minute smalls miracle, a custom piece of furniture executed with surgical precision, or simply someone who would patiently let me find just the right thing, they showed up.

Over time, I realized that sourcing from signatory shops not only made my job easier, but it was also making the industry stronger. My rentals helped build better inventory, funded healthcare and living wages for my union kin, and preserved the iconic set pieces that define our industry rather than letting them vanish into landfills. The dollars spent at these shops strengthened our community, so even if it meant hearing a tour guide trot out the Casablanca piano story at WB for the hundredth time, it was worth it.

In a career where everything can feel so fleeting, where you and your coworkers migrate job to job, locations are upended daily, and scripts change as often as the wind, union prop houses remain consistent, and we should be proud to support them in that. Amazon and Walmart don't need our money; they don't nurture our crafts, our neighbors, or our pension and health plans. Signatory shops do. Every rental or custom order is an investment, and the returns come in the form of stability, jurisdictional protection, and the preservation of what makes Los Angeles the historic filmmaking epicenter of the United States. I learned all the way back on my trial-by-fire first day that signatory shops keep all of us in Local 44 from sinking. And that's exactly why we must keep them afloat.

"Choose quality, choose solidarity, choose to invest in the future of our crafts"

When I first got the call to work at the Universal Prop Shop twenty years ago, it was supposed to be just a two-day job. I had no idea those two days would become my entire career. But that's the thing about Local 44 signatory prop shops: once you witness the skill, dedication, and teamwork inside those walls, you understand why people stay. These shops aren't just rental houses, they're a cornerstone of property work in Los Angeles.

Signatory prop houses are where craftsmanship and creativity meet the daily realities of production. They upholster, refinish, weld, and problem-solve with a level of expertise you won't find at a big-box store. Whether it's a single period-accurate lamp or an arsenal of custom upholstered dinner booths, the work consistently surpasses expectations. These shops open early, stay late, and step up whenever productions need support. That commitment to quality and reliability is what makes them irreplaceable. And unlike online retailers, you never have to worry about shipping delays, inaccurate descriptions, or cheaply made items that won't survive a day on set. Their deep, reusable inventories are built and vetted by union hands, without the uncertainty of supply chain

disruptions or late deliveries. Renting union means getting the right item at the right time, with no surprises.

But what truly sets these shops apart is who's inside them. When you choose a signatory prop house, you're supporting fellow union members protected by the fair wages and safe workplaces Local 44 has spent decades fighting for. Every dollar spent at a signatory shop keeps union kin working while contributing directly to the health and pension plans that support our entire membership. Supporting these shops keeps specialists in woodworking, upholstery, greens, drapery, and more actively practicing the trades they've mastered, and it allows shops to maintain and grow the inventory productions rely on. It also reinforces the collective power that allows us to negotiate strong contracts and protect our jurisdiction.

Make no mistake: the choices we make about where we source materials and props shape the future of our place in this industry. Shopping signatories means higher quality, greater consistency, and the real-world expertise needed to keep pace with fast-moving shoots. But

it also protects something far more fragile: the skills and knowledge inside these shops that cannot be rebuilt once they disappear. If we cheap out on rentals and fabrication, those crafts go quiet. When we support our signatory shops, we're proving that their work is worth more than two-day shipping. So I'm asking you, make signatory shops your first call. Choose quality. Choose solidarity. Choose to invest in the people who make filmed entertainment in Los Angeles possible. When we support our signatory shops, we protect our legacy, strengthen our union family, and ensure the next generation of craftspeople steps into a thriving industry.






A LEGACY OF CRAFT AND **COLLABORATION**

Walk into Independent Studio Services in Sunland and you immediately sense a mix of history, artistry, and possibility. For nearly fifty years, ISS has been a cornerstone of Hollywood's prop community. It's where sourcing, finding, or fabricating the pieces that make stories feel real all happen under one roof. With more than 1.5 million items across a 17acre campus, the company functions as both archive and laboratory for creative problem-solving.

Since its founding in 1977, ISS has positioned itself as a one-stop union shop serving productions of every scale. The company's prop offerings include weapons, media, set decoration, expendables, graphics, and custom manufacturing. From major features to indie web series, clients rely on ISS to source, build, or adapt virtually anything a scene demands. Their motto says it best: "If we don't have it, we'll buy it. If we can't buy it, we'll make it."

EXPERIENCE YOU CAN TRUST

The strength of ISS lies in its people. Employees come from a wide range of creative and technical backgrounds, many through its in-house apprenticeship program, which provides a pathway to IATSE Local 44 membership. About 40 percent of ISS employees belong to Local 44, reflecting both the success of the apprenticeship program and the company's ongoing commitment to fair, union-based working conditions.

Other ISS workers join from on-set departments such as hair and makeup, VFX, or postproduction. This mix of skills and on-set experience allows the team to anticipate what crews need before they ask. Taken together, the full Sunland staff brings nearly 300 years of experience to the shop, ensuring that apprentices learn directly from seasoned professionals and that their in-house expertise and craftsmanship pass from one generation to the next.

SPECIALISTS IN SAFETY

While ISS handles every kind of prop, it is especially respected for its weapons division, often described as the largest private armory in North America. Firearms, replicas, armor, and tactical gear are maintained by trained specialists who understand both realism and safety.

That commitment extends to set support. ISS regularly sends its armorers and media experts to productions to train crews, supervise handling, and help troubleshoot. Having specialists on site helps maintain safety standards while preserving the authenticity filmmakers expect. As the industry strengthens its commitment to on-set safety, ISS's proactive approach has become a model for responsible weapons handling, proof that creative excellence and crew wellbeing can and must go hand in hand.

A LIVING ARCHIVE

The ISS inventory spans eras and genres, from vintage typewriters and mid-century appliances to futuristic drones and tactical gear. Showrooms are organized by period or theme, allowing decorators to move seamlessly from Western saloons

to sleek modern apartments. Each aisle reflects decades of cinematic history, yet the space continues to evolve, constantly expanding to meet the needs of new productions.

As the industry shifts, so does ISS. As the rhythm of large-scale features and television series changes, demand for commercials, music videos, student projects, and live events has surged. ISS embraces that evolution, welcoming both emerging creators and long-time studio clients with the same level of care. When the perfect piece doesn't exist, the fabrication team builds it in-house, ensuring that every project—whether a blockbuster or a first-time short—has the tools to tell its story authentically.

COMMUNITY, CRAFT, & CONTINUITY

ISS believes a prop house should be more than a warehouse. It is a creative partner and a community of craftspeople dedicated to storytelling. Visitors to Sunland find walls lined with posters celebrating past productions alongside workstations where apprentices learn and build. Nearly five decades after opening its doors, ISS continues to stand out for the scale of its collection, the depth of its staff, and its commitment to union training and on-set safety. ISS remains true to its promise: always ready to build, source, or invent whatever the story requires.

JACKSON SHRUB SUPPLY: A HOLLYWOOD LEGACY SINCE 1937

Jackson Shrub Supply, Inc. has been a cornerstone of Hollywood's greens and props community for nearly nine decades. Family-owned and operated since 1937, the company has grown from a small supplier into one of the industry's most trusted sources for live and artificial plants, greenery, and specialty proprentals for film, television, and large-scale events.

The story begins in the early 1930s, when founder Cecil Shelby Jackson worked as a greensman at MGM Studios. Recognizing a growing need for reliable greens sourcing, he launched Jackson Shrub Supply in 1937, providing cut brush and foliage to Hollywood. By the early 1970s, Cecil retired and passed the business to his son, Keith Jackson, who expanded operations and laid the groundwork for the company's modern identity. In 1973, Keith's son Gary joined the team and in-

troduced live plant rentals, a major turning point that helped the company keep pace with Hollywood's evolving production needs.

The 1980s brought another wave of growth as Jackson Shrub added prop rentals, widening its creative and logistical reach. In 1988, the company relocated to its current thirteen-acre North Hollywood facility, a campus equipped with automated irrigation systems, hand-watered plant stock, and 16-foot shade structures for jungle and sun-sensitive species. That same year, the fourth generation, Kevin Jackson, joined the business to support Keith and Gary before going off to college, and later returning to contribute his many years of financial experience and other progressive business skillsets. After Keith's retirement in 1995, Gary assumed full leadership; soon after, the acquisition of Walter Allen Plant Rentals of Hollywood significantly expanded the company's inventory of live plants, silk greens, specialty props, and custom-built artificials.

In the early 2000s, Gary's daughter, Julie, joined the operation for more than fifteen years, followed in 2013 by their brother Ryan, who now oversees day-to-day management, operations, and customer

relationships. Ryan continues bringing fresh energy and a long-term vision for the future. This multi-generational leadership continues to pilot Jackson Shrub through the rapid changes of the film and television landscape, ensuring the company remains both adaptable and deeply rooted in its heritage.

SCOPE, SERVICES, AND A GROWING CREATIVE FOOTPRINT

Today, Jackson Shrub employs more than 50 team members, including six union employees and numerous staff with decades of experience maintaining, preparing, and organizing the company's extensive collection. Their offerings span live and silk plants, built trees, holiday décor, landscape elements, and an ever-evolving library of specialty props.

The team's expertise in both living and artificial plant environments allows them to bring sets to life with authenticity, scale, and attention to detail. Whether productions need jungle-dense foliage, mid-century landscaping, seasonal installations, or hard-to-find specialty plant varieties, Jackson Shrub provides guidance on visual aesthetic, logistics, and overall design. Their staff is known for sourcing rare species, matching exacting creative

WALKING THE AISLES AT WARNER BROTHERS

Walking into the Warner Bros. Prop House, one notices the scale immediately. Aisles of furniture, hand props, lighting, and décor stretch on like a living archive. The environment feels active and grounded, defined not just by the inventory but by the people who know it intimately. WB crew members have spent years inside these walls, developing a mental map of where everything lives and how productions actually use it.

The work inside Drapery, Upholstery, and Flooring is hands-on and highly specialized. Drapery manages soft-goods rentals, motorized shades, classic window treatments, and custom fabric pieces. Upholstery builds custom furniture and handles cushion work. Flooring measures for projects, travels to stages or locations, and installs, restores, or deepcleans floors. Together, these teams work closely with set decorators, designers,

art directors, and construction coordinators to support a project from the first conversation to final installation.

KNOWLEDGE THAT DELIVERS

The Property Department's twenty permanent IATSE crew members bring roughly 130 years of combined experience to the job. With nearly 383,000 items spread across Property and Drapery, that depth of knowledge is essential. Not all inventory appears online, and finding specific pieces often depends on the experts who know the space best. People like Carmen Rojo, who navigates the hand prop area with uncanny accuracy, or Kellen Mitchell, who can identify the aisle and shelf of a furniture piece based solely on description, help productions keep pace with demanding schedules.

Maintaining such a large collection requires constant cleaning, repair, and organization. The team works every day to improve systems and refine the overall shopping experience, acknowledging that caring for hundreds of thousands of items is an ongoing effort.

EXPERTS WITH REAL BACKGROUNDS

A big part of what makes Warner Bros.

unique is the mix of experience across the team. Many staff members have spent years in film and television and instinctively understand the rhythm of production work. Others arrived from very different lines of work, and their diverse backgrounds round out the group, bringing extra skills and problem-solving styles that make the whole department that much more capable and adept.

In Hand Props, Sean Jackson draws on his security experience when handling questions about police or tactical items. At Lanark, Mickey Hunt applies the resourcefulness he developed on "Survivor," where making something work with limited tools was part of the job. He has a reputation for being able to MacGyver nearly anything when the situation calls for it. In Fixtures, Slick Barton's lifelong habit of tinkering allows him to adapt or build fixtures using creative solutions. In Collections, Denise Grisco brings deep furniture and design knowledge from her years at Lennie Marvin.

These individual strengths directly affect the service Warner Bros. provides. Clients often discover that the exact expertise they need is already built into the team.


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PROP HOUSE

CULTURE OF CRAFTSMANSHIP & CARE

At Universal's Prop House and Drapery departments, skill and experience meet a genuine spirit of collaboration. These are not just warehouses full of furniture and fabric. They are active, working spaces where crews solve problems, customize pieces, and help productions bring entire worlds to life. Many of the staff have been part of the studio system for years, and their knowledge runs deep. They understand what works on camera, how to meet fast-moving production timelines, and what makes a space feel specific and true.

In the Drapery Shop, fabricators handle everything involving fabric and soft goods. Custom drapery, bedding, upholstery, and specialty soft-fabric installations are all part of their day to day. They work with precision and an eye for period accuracy, and their fluency in design eras allows them to identify styles by decade and support productions looking to get the details right. Their work helps ensure that textiles, shapes, and surfaces match the tone and time period of the story.

Across the larger Prop House, staff are equipped to handle repairs and light modifications when a piece needs to be adjusted for camera. Whether it is tightening a fixture, touching up a finish, or making sure an item is production ready, the team works together to keep things functioning smoothly.

"HOW CAN WE HELP YOU?"

What really sets Universal apart is the team's attitude. The Prop House is known for being helpful, knowledgeable, and refreshingly unpretentious. Designers and decorators often say the same thing: it feels good to work here. There is always someone around to answer a question, offer ideas, or help track down that one hard-to-find piece that pulls an entire environment together.

It is not just about providing access to props and set dressing. It is about creating a space where people feel welcome to ask for help. Whether it is a first-time visitor or a long-time designer/decorators, the staff consistently approaches each interaction with a "how can we help you" mindset. That philosophy builds trust, and over time it has become a defining part of the Prop House culture.

AN INVENTORY THAT INSPIRES

Universal's inventory reflects years of steady production use and thoughtful curation. The collection is especially strong in smalls and set dressing, including hand props, kitchenware, vintage décor, lighting, artwork, and the thousands of subtle details that make a set feel dimensional and lived in. There is something here for almost any kind of world, from contemporary spaces to stylized environments or character-driven interiors.

Designers/Decorators often come in with a plan and leave with discoveries. Walking the aisles can spark inspiration and reveal options that shift a scene in a more interesting direction. The collection is practical and wide-ranging, but it also invites exploration.

At the end of the day, the Universal Prop House is not just about what is on the shelves. It is about the people behind the work, the fabricators and organizers, and the team members who bring a mix of technical skill and openhearted support to every project that comes through the door.
